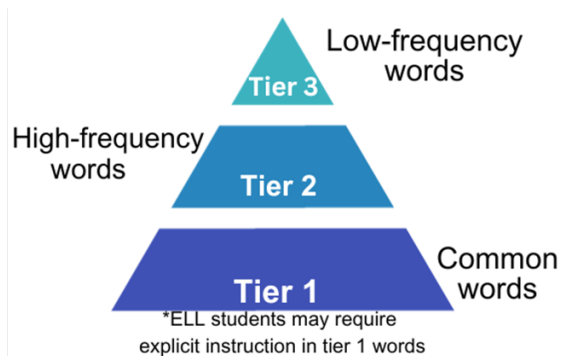


Explicit Instruction Power Hour Vocabulary Note Catcher

How should I teach vocabulary?

Characteristics of effective vocabulary instruction

- Instruction is clear and unambiguous
- Instruction involves the presentation of word meanings and contextual examples
- Multiple exposures to the word are provided
- Sufficient instructional time is devoted to vocabulary instruction

Vocabulary routine: IPIC

- **I**ntroduce the word
 - Write word on board or display on screen
 - Read word and have students repeat word
 - Include part of speech
 - Show the word broken down into word parts or tap out the oral syllables
- **P**rovide student-friendly explanation
 - Option 1: Provide the explanation
 - Option 2: Break definition into critical attributes
 - Option 3: Introduce word using morphemes
- **I**llustrate with examples
 - Concrete examples (object or act out)
 - Visual examples
 - Verbal examples
- **C**heck for understanding
 - Option 1: Have students discern between examples and non-examples
 - Option 2: Have students generate examples
 - Option 3: Ask deep processing questions
 - Option 4: Compare/Contrast
